

## Criterion for Inclusion on HIV.gov Events Page

The goal of the HIV.gov event page is to provide resources that can be used to educate the HIV community and the Federal workforce about current topics in HIV prevention, care and treatment and research, and the use of digital communication in response to HIV and viral hepatitis.

The objectives of our events page are as follows:

- Promote Federally-sponsored events (webinars, conferences and Twitter chats) on HIV and infectious diseases, as well as non-Federal webinars on those topics
- Assist the HIV community to work towards identifying event dates that avoid overlap with previously scheduled key national HIV events
- Encourage our Federal and non-Federal partners to suggest events for inclusion and promotion
- Promote HIV.gov's coverage related videos, blogs and webinar page planning resources
- Feature events with descriptive information and registration instructions
- Archive products (slides and audio files) from HIV.gov-supported Federal webinars, as possible.

Subject to space availability and team capacity, we will add events to this page based on the following criteria:

The event is of national interest and addresses a central aspect of the collective response to the HIV epidemic and to the occurrence of viral hepatitis, both domestically and internationally.

If it is a Federal event, the roster of speakers and moderators includes 1) Senior U.S. Government leaders who play key roles in the Federal response to the HIV epidemic, and/or 2) HIV.gov team members as presenters or organizers.

If it is a non-Federal event, the event is sponsored by a national recognized community leadership/organization and/or grantees that are also partners of OHAIDP and/or HIV.gov.

The event does not advocate a particular political position or encourage political advocacy, and the subject matter is presented in scientifically and medically accurate ways.

The event does not include a request for fundraising.

The event's content will be of long-term interest to the HIV community and the viral hepatitis community.

The event is open to the general public at no cost, or, is a Federal training center conference or webinar offered at nominal cost.
